

Today in America, who your parents are and where you grow up are still the most determinative factors of your life *chances*



Inequity has been built into our laws and way of life since our beginnings and the impacts manifest today




Redlining maps from 1930's Chicago, which directed investment to white communities and disinvested in communities of color

Opportunity is not.











Major Household Expenditures vs. Median Income



The changing economy, regressive policies, and skills mismatch are combining to make things worse - concentrating opportunity and wealth in fewer places and hands








Part of the solution is clear... enable millions more Americans to achieve the milestones that lead to thriving adulthood

This demands a systemic place-based approach addressing the individual and environmental factors impacting mobility




This approach is being demonstrated by a growing field of placebased partnerships devoted to producing sustained economic mobility nationally... one neighborhood and region at a time




